Putting Up the Lines

The wires which tied the houses of rural people together also seemed to unite their spirits.

- Clyde T. Ellis A Giant Step

n July 28, 1936, the government gave final approval for a loan of \$275,000 for the construction of electric lines to all parts of Colquitt County and sections of Brooks, Worth, Tilt, Thomas and Mitchell counties. When all the plans for the electrification project had been drawn, Colquitt County Rural Electric Company was granted its formal charter on September 28, 1936. At this point, the Moultrie Chamber of Commerce stepped back into the picture to aid in securing right-of-way and signing potential customers along the power line routes. "ELECTRIC LIGHTS AND POWER ON EVERY FARM" was the slogan adopted by the committee. In July of 1937, lines were energized and Colquitt Countians had lights!

A few weeks after the Moultrie-Berlin line was energized, the line to Ellenton was complete. From that point to the present there has been a steady development of the system, inter-

rupted only by World War II.
Colquitt County Flural Electric
Company was divorced from
commissioner-sponsorship in
1939 and directors were added from other counties being
served.

The Colquitt County Rural Electric Company moved from downtown Moultrie into its headquarters building on Rowland Drive in 1950. In 1960, an addition was constructed to give more ware-



house space. In 1965, another addition was completed providing office space, an auditorium and a kitchen. A district office was opened in Valdosta during the latter part of 1969, By 1976, a district office had been opened in Tifton, and branch offices were open in Adel, Nashville, and Outtman. In 1978, the entire headquarters building in Moultrie was remodeled with additional office and warehouse space being added.

On August 8, 1974, Colquitt County Rural Electric Company joined with 38 other cooperatives in the state and founded Oglethorpe Power Corporation. Oglethorpe Power Corporation resulted from a realization by the cooperatives that it was necessary for them to become involved in the generation and transmission of electricity, as well as the distribution. In October 1976, by vote of the membership, the name of the cooperative was changed from Colquitt County Rural Electric Company to Colquitt Electric Membership Corporation.









- Air conditioners
- Ceiling fans
- Clothes washers

- Doors

- Refrigerators

WaterSense® products with a purchase price of \$1,500 or less per item

- Bathroom sink faucets and accessories (such as aerators)
- High-efficiency toilets
- High-efficiency urinals
- Showerheads

LOOK OP for hazards during harvest

To stay safe around overhead power lines during the long days of harvesting, farm operators and workers are urged to follow this safety tips:

- · Use a spotter when operating large machinery near power lines.
- Use care when raising augers or the bed of grain trucks around power lines.
- Keep equipment at least 10 feet from power lines at all times, in all directions.
- Inspect the height of farm equipment to determine clearance.
- Always remember to lower extensions when moving loads.
- Never attempt to move a power line out of the way or raise it for clearance.
- If a power line is sagging or low, call Colquitt EMC.

If contact is made with a power line, stay on the equipment. Make sure to warn others to stay away, and call 911. Do not leave until the utility crew says it is safe to do so. The only reason to exit is if the equipment is on fire. If this is the case, jump off the equipment with your feet together, without touching the ground and vehicle at the same time. Then, still keeping your feet together, hop to safety as you leave the area.

Some additional safety tips:

- Do not use metal poles when breaking up grain inside and around grain bins.
- Always hire qualified electricians for any electrical issues.
- · Do not use equipment with frayed cables.

Recipes of the Month



Coffee Ice Cream Pie

INGREDIENTS

Yield: 8 Servings

2 (1 ounce) unsweetened chocolate squares

14 cup butter, cubed

1 (5 ounce) can evaporated milk

1/2 cup sugar

1 pint coffee ice cream, softened

1 (8 inch) chocolate crumb crust

1 (8 ounce) carton frozen whipped topping, thawed 14 cup chopped pecans

DIRECTIONS

Melt chocolate and butter. Stir in milk and sugar. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Cook and stir until thickened. Remove from the heat and cool completely. Spoon ice cream into crust. Stir sauce and spread over ice cream. Top with whipped topping and sprinkle with pecans. Freeze until firm. Remove from the freezer 15 minutes before serving.



Fall Harvest Oatmeal Raisin Cookies

INGREDIENTS

Yield: 3 Dozen

1 cup butter, softened

1 cup brown sugar, packed

1/3 cup granulated sugar

2 large eggs

1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

2 1/2 cups quick-cooking oatmeal (Not instant)

1 cup golden raisin

1 (10 ounce) package cinnamon baking chips

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 350'. In a large bowl, cream together Butter and both brown and granulated sugar. Add both eggs, vanilla extract and pie spice and mix well. Add baking soda, flour, oatmeal, raisins and cinnamon chips and mix well (by hand is best). You can either roll dough into approx 2 inch balls or use the drop method onto cookie sheets lined with parchment paper and bake at 350' approx 9-12 minutes or until light golden brown. Let cool 1 minute and remove to wire racks to cool completely.

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
