Colquitt EMC Celebrates 82 Years! 2018 Annual Meeting Highlights

Amid beautiful fall weather, 2,386 Colquitt EMC members attended the cooperative's Annual Meeting of Members held at Spence Field in Moultrie on October 30.

Prior to the business meeting, members and their guests enjoyed a delicious lunch prepared by the Colquitt County FFA and enjoyed entertainment by "Omega Quartet". Attendees also enjoyed participating in a health fair and playing "Electro Bingo" & "The Wheel of Energy"

Board President Don Copeland presided over the Business Meeting. As the meeting opened, Stephanie Spriggs Walker performed the National Anthem, and Rev. Randy Epps from The Bridge Church delivered the invocation. Mary Beth Watson, Vice President Accounting Administration, Sunbelt Expo, delivered greetings and Lisa Smart, Executive Director of the Berrien County Chamber Commerce, welcomed attendees.

Cooperative Attorney James Thagard presented the election results. Bobby Exum, Lowndes County and Gary Branch, Worth/Tift Counties were re-elected to serve three-year terms. Clay Underwood, Colquitt County, was newly elected to serve a three-year term on the board.

On behalf of the Board of Directors and Staff of Colquitt EMC, General Manager Danny Nichols presented a plaque in recognition of retiring director Bobby Griner's dedicated service and leadership to the Cooperative. Margaret Griner

accepted the plaque for her husband who was unable to attend. Elected in October of 1976, Griner served District 1 (Colquitt County) for 42 years. During his time on the Board, he held the following offices: President (6 years), Vice President (4 years) and Secretary-Treasurer years). By winning the area event, Robert has advanced to compete at the state level for scholarship monies. Sponsored by the EMCs of Georgia and organized through the Georgia Department of Education's Agricultural Education division, the wiring competition is designed to promote electrification programs for agriculture students. asked the members in attendance to thank Colquitt EMC employees for their hard work in restoration and recovery efforts following Hurricane Michael. Tommy Cothron, Secretary-Treasurer, informed the membership that the Cooperative is financially sound.

Colquitt EMC's General Manager, Danny Nichols, announced that Colquitt EMC will be returning more than \$2 million in capital credits during the month of December. Nichols shared that in the late seventies, the Board of Directors approved a plan to convert Colquitt EMC's electric system voltage from 7,200 volts to 14,400 volts. Converting voltage requires changing out all of the electrical system except for the wire and the poles. The

system is converted in sections; Colquitt EMC was able to finish the final sections in the 2000's. Nichols reported that Colquitt EMC's total system has been operating at 14,400 for approximately 16 years. He also announced that Colquitt EMC's rates are 12% lower than the average in the State.

At the conclusion of the business meeting, a prize drawing was held for members in attendance which is always a crowd-pleaser!!

December 2018 Capital Credit Refund

Colquitt EMC will refund \$2,022,732.44 to some of its members in December. The refund represents capital credits assigned to members who received electricity in **1997**. The cooperative is currently retiring capital credits on a 20 year rotating plan adopted by the Board of Directors. Submitted for your approval is a list of electronic gifts sure to bring a smile to the receiver. There is something for everyone, and it's good to remember that the happiest people are not those getting more, but those giving more.

Smart Lighting

Give the ability to control lighting remotely and with voice-activated devices like Alexa. You can start small with a "Philips Hue starter kit" (\$148) that comes with a normal white and a



color ambiance bulb or go big with a "LIFX tile modular light surface" (\$235) that can create custom dimmable patterns, images, and waveforms in over 16 million colors.

Robot vacuum cleaner or mop

Everyone can use an extra hand keeping there home neat and clean. A robot vacuum like the "iRobot Roomba



690" (\$300) or a robot mop like the "iRobot Braava 380t" (\$299) can automatically keep your floors clean, and they even recharge themselves.

Virtual Robot Assistant

Think Alexa with wheels. "Anki Vector" (\$250) is a voice-activated mobile robot that can interact with its environment, for example, answer



simple questions by accessing the internet like what is the weather today, recognize faces, move around avoiding obstacles, respond to touch, speak and recharge himself.

Video doorbell and locks

Add security and convenience to any home with a "Ring Video Doorbell" (\$99 - \$249). Lets you see, hear and speak to visitors from your phone, tablet or PC. Couple with an "August Smart Lock" (\$255) and have remote access to locking and unlocking your door.



Smart plugs and light switches

Lighting switches and electrical outlets can become voice-activated, remotely controlled and set to operate on a schedule with a "Leviton DW15S-1BZ smart switch: (\$43) and a "TP-Link Kasa Mini Outlet Smart Plug" (\$27).



Key Finder

This gift will be appreciated every time keys are misplaced. The "Tile Sport – Key Finder" (\$45) makes an audible ring when activated via a smartphone. It can even be used in reverse to find a misplaced phone by pressing the button on the tile.

Recipes of the Month



Bacon Wrapped Scallops

INGREDIENTS

Yields: 40

2 lbs bacon (regular sliced, not thick)
2 lbs sea scallops (if very large, cut in half)
3 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon minced garlic
1/3 cup chicken broth

DIRECTIONS

Cut bacon strips in half. Wrap a piece of bacon around each scallop; secure with toothpick. Arrange the wrapped scallops on a baking sheet. Broil 5 inches from heat for 3 minutes per side, or until bacon is crisp. In small skillet, melt butter; add garlic and saute 1 minute. Add broth and bring to a boil. Cook 2 minutes. Place scallops in large bowl; pour broth over, Gently toss to coat.



Cranberry Appetizer

INGREDIENTS

Serves: 4

1 tablespoon butter 2 cups thinly sliced onions 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar 1/2 cup dried cranberries 1 tablespoon sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind 16 crackers

8 ounces reduced-fat cream cheese

DIRECTIONS

Melt butter in a pan over medium heat. Add onions and sauté 15 to 18 minutes, or until golden and tender. Stir in vinegar, cranberries, sugar, salt, and orange rind; Cook, stirring occasionally, 2 to 4 minutes or until liquid is reduced to about 2 tablespoons. Spread cream cheese onto the crackers. Top each with cranberry compote.

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
