Spring cleaning for energy savings

Warmer weather and longer days make this time of year perfect for sprucing up your home. While cleaning your house, follow these tips for a lower power bill.

- Clean out your dryer vent.

 A vent blocked with lint can double your dryer energy cost.
- Change your air filter and vacuum the grill.


 Dirty filters and grills block airflow which increases cooling cost.
- Clean ceiling fan blades and use fans only when a room is occupied.

 Clean fan blades are more efficient; and, remember...fans cool people, not furniture.
- **Dust everything.** Air vents, light bulbs, and electronics. This is a great time to be sure all your light bulbs are the LED type.
- **Set your thermostat to optimal settings** 78°F or higher as much as possible when cooling your home.
- Clean out the refrigerator and vacuum your refrigerator coils.

 Better air circulation in the refrigerator increases efficiency.







Know what's BELOW, CALL before you dig.

Planning a home improvement job? Planting a tree? Installing a fence or deck? WAIT! Here's what you need to know first:

Whether you are planning to do it yourself or hire a professional, smart digging means calling **811** before each job. Homeowners often make risky assumptions about whether or not they should get their utility lines marked, but every digging job requires a call – even a small project like planting trees and shrubs.

The depth of utility lines varies and there may be multiple utility lines in a common area. Digging without calling can disrupt service to an entire neighborhood, harm you and those around you and potentially result in fines and repair costs. In compliance with O.C.G.A. Section 44-12-236 of "The Disposition of Unclaimed Property Act" of Georgia, Colquitt EMC is attempting to locate former members and heirs whose capital credit checks were issued December 1, 2014 for electrical service received in 1993, but which have been returned by the U.S. Post Office as "undeliverable" or have been otherwise unclaimed.



A current database of these members, with their last known address, is available at our offices. The last possible date to claim these funds is June 30, 2020. All funds not claimed by this date will be donated for charitable uses, as permitted by O.C.G.A. section 44-12-236 of "The Disposition of Unclaimed Capital Property Act" of Georgia.

Strawberry Blueberry Salsa

INGREDIENTS

Serves: 4

3/4 cup chopped strawberries

1/3 cup blueberries

2 tablespoons chopped bell peppers

2 tablespoons chopped carrots

1 tablespoon chopped onion

2 teaspoons cider vinegar

1 teaspoon minced jalapeno pepper

1/8 teaspoon ground ginger

DIRECTIONS

Combine all ingredients in a small bowl. Let stand 20 minutes to allow flavors to blend. Serve with grilled fish or pork or chicken.



Strawberry Breakfast Salsa

INGREDIENTS

Serves: 4

1/3 cup apricot jam

3 tablespoons water

1 teaspoon cinnamon

2 pints strawberries, stemmed and diced into 1/4 inch squares

DIRECTIONS

In a medium bowl, whisk jam, water and cinnamon; add strawberries. Toss gently to combine. Serve salsa over pancakes, waffles, French toast, hot cereal, or mix into plain yogurt. You could warm this up a little if you prefer.
