

A Message... FROM OUR PRESIDENT/CEO

My Fellow Members,

Last month, I wrote to you about the economic uncertainty that we have been experiencing over the past 18 months. Specifically, I described how our costs at the EMC have increased in the same way costs have increased to each of us personally. The largest and most impactful increase has been in the cost of power that your EMC delivers to all of its members. The fuel that powers our generation has seen dramatic and unpredictable increases that affect your EMC every day.

Unfortunately, this increase in the cost of our wholesale power is only part of the economic impact we see at the EMC. We have experienced



With all of the pressures of cost increases, it requires all utilities (or any business for that matter) to look at their revenue to be sure all these costs of doing business can be paid accordingly. For Colquitt EMC, we must examine these costs to be certain we can meet all the financial goals that are required by our lending institutions as well as meet other contractual obligations we have with other entities. One of our main goals at Colquitt EMC is to make sufficient margins above all of our costs to do business. The good thing about a cooperative is that any margins we make are returned to our members as Capital Credits or as a credit on their EMC bills.

With the rapid increase in costs, we must consider the idea of a rate increase for our membership. The last rate increases we have had were in 1991 and then in 2012. We do not begin discussions about rate increases without a lot of thought. We have been monitoring this situation closely. Many businesses have already raised their prices to cover costs. Recently, the investor-owned utility in Georgia announced it would be seeking a 12% rate increase. At this time, we haven't finalized our numbers; but they are not close to that 12% number.

I hope our members recognize that we do not wish to have rate increases. I am a member, as well as 75% of our employees. We also enjoy the low rates that Colquitt EMC provides. I believe that even with the possibility of a rate increase, Colquitt EMC will still have some of the lowest rates in the state. We ask for your support and understanding as we work through these difficult times.


AUGUST IS ACOUNT NUMBER AWARENESS MONTH

Your account number is the key to managing your Colquitt EMC account! August is dedicated to educating our membership on the importance of knowing your account number and all the ways it can be utilized.


Where is my Account Number?

Your account number is an 11-digit number located on the top left corner of your bill and on the payment stub.


We recommend storing your account number in your wallet or in your phone for easy access.

Your account number may be utilized to access our mobile app and online account portal—as well as, to access the automated bill pay and outage reporting system by calling 1-855-293-1804.



Inflationary pressures have raised energy prices to new highs. With new challenges also come new opportunities. Utilize these tips to aid with rising energy prices:

• Keep Your A/C Unit well-maintained.

Did you know that heating/cooling your home makes up 43% of your yearly energy cost? (Source: Energy Star)

For example:

- Change your air filters regularly
- o Cut back vegetation from your outdoor air conditioning unit
- Rinse outdoor coils regularly with a garden hose.

• Use energy management tools to stay "energy-aware."

You can visit colquittemc.com to set up "High Energy Use Alerts". High Energy Use Alerts will automatically notify you when your daily energy cost exceeds your target bill amount.

• Re-evaluate upgrading old low-efficiency appliances.

Higher energy prices make appliance upgrades more attractive. When replacing equipment, look at life cycle cost, not just the first cost. Though initially more expensive, a higher efficiency appliance will save you more money than the cheaper option over the life of the appliance.

• Assess the thermal efficiency of your home.


When energy prices are low, improvements to thermal efficiency like adding ceiling insulation are difficult to justify. Higher energy prices can change the economics of thermal enhancements and may be worth a second look.

• Optimize air conditioning run times.

"Set it and Forget it" is not the most energy-efficient method of operating your air conditioner. Raising the temperature setting on your thermostat as much as possible will reduce cooling costs. A smart thermostat can take the guesswork out of thermostat settings and optimize cooling energy use.

Roasted Veggies

INGREDIENTS

Serves: 6-8

3 carrots, peeled and cut into about 2-inch pieces (if you can, purchase thick carrots for this)

2 big onions (cut into 6 wedges)

1 large red bell pepper, seeded and cut into thick strips

1 large green bell pepper, seeded and cut into thick strips

1 yellow squash, cut into quarters lengthwise

1 -2 large zucchini, cut into quarters, lengthwise

1/4 cup olive oil (or to taste)

1-2 tablespoon minced garlic *(optional)* salt and pepper

Lemon Mustard Dressing

1/4 cup olive oil

2 tablespoons water

2 teaspoons red wine vinegar

2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice

2 teaspoons Dijon mustard minced shallot (minced garlic may be substituted for the shallots)

salt and pepper fresh herbs (optional)

DIRECTIONS

Set oven to 400°F. Grease a large baking sheet/pan. Mix all the veggies with olive oil and garlic (if using) to coat well. Season with salt and pepper. Place on the baking pan. Roast in oven for about 30-35 minutes, or until tender. To make the lemon-mustard vinaigrette: whisk all ingredients together while the veggies are roasting. Place the roasted veggies in a serving bowl and pour the vinaigrette over the warm veggies, then serve. Garnish with fresh herbs if desired and enjoy!
