Maintain at least a 10-foot distance Ensure all farm workers are trained on electrical safety procedures. from power lines when operating equipment like grain augers, Regularly inspect all electrical elevators and other tall machinery. equipment and machinery for signs of wear and damage. Use a spotter to navigate safely around power lines and other Keep first aid kits and emergency electrical equipment. . contact numbers in an easily accessible location.

Sour Cream Enchiladas

INGREDIENTS

- 1 lb. Chicken Breast, diced
- 1 medium onion, minced 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 8 (8 inch) flour tortillas, softened 1 ½ cups grated Monterey jack or Mexican blend cheese, divided
- ¼ cup butter
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1 (15 ounce) can chicken broth
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 (4-ounce) can of chopped green chilies

DIRECTIONS

In a frying pan, cook chicken and onion together in oil over medium-high heat until the chicken is just done. Divide cooked chicken evenly between 8 tortillas; add 1 1/2 tablespoons cheese to each tortilla. Roll enchiladas and place seam-side down in a 9x13" baking dish that has been lightly sprayed with no-stick cooking spray. Melt butter in a medium saucepan; stir in flour to make a roux, stir and cook until bubbly, and gradually whisk in chicken broth then bring to boiling, stirring frequently. Remove from heat; stir in sour cream and green chilies. Pour sauce evenly over the enchiladas. Top with remaining 3/4 cup cheese (a baking dish may be double-wrapped and frozen at this point) and bake at 400° F for 20 minutes until cheese is melted and sauce near edges of baking dish is bubbly.
