


A Message... FROM OUR PRESIDENT/CEO

My Fellow Members,

Over the past two months, I have written articles for our Member Newsletter; and that is an unusual occurrence. The intent of the articles was to explain how Colquitt EMC is being affected by rising costs (or inflation). These costs are forcing us to examine the rates we charge for electric energy. Our cost of wholesale power has increased between 15% and 20%. A sharp increase in the cost of the fuels that power our generating plants has been the number one reason for that

increase. We have also dealt with an increase in the cost of materials that we use daily.



Our history shows that Colquitt EMC is committed to being a low-cost power provider. This is a large part of who we are and who we have been. If you visit the Georgia Public Service Commission website, you will find a list of electric rates for residential accounts. This list includes retail rates for all EMCs in Georgia, all municipal electric systems, and the one investor-owned utility (Georgia Power). These retail rates are maintained from 1997 through 2022. I have analyzed this 26-year history of retail rate information, and my analysis revealed several things. In the summer, Colquitt EMC was ranked as the seventh lowest EMC among 41 EMCs and Georgia Power for the last 26 years. Also in the summer, Colquitt EMC rates were over 9% less than the average of all these providers since 1997. In addition, our summer rates were over 12% less than those of Georgia Power for the past 26 years.

Georgia Power recently requested a 12% increase in its rates to take affect over the next 3 years. The good news is that we are only seeking 5.5%. The other good news is that we are a non-profit cooperative. All margins above our cost to provide electric service are returned to our members.

Colquitt EMC always works to provide the best possible service at the lowest possible cost. A recent example of this commitment occurred when we realized a need for better facilities at our headquarters in Moultrie. Any business, especially a utility, needs proper facilities to provide good service. Some of our facilities were built in 1949. As we formulated plans to upgrade our Moultrie campus, we made goals. The primary goal was to build these new facilities from our existing cash flow and not borrow money to build them. We were successful in this endeavor and paid for these buildings as they were constructed. We have now been in the new facilities for over three years, and we do not have one penny of debt.

It is our intention to always be good stewards of the money we collect. We will constantly strive to be a low-cost provider of electric energy and still provide quality customer service. These will always be in the forefront of everything we do at Colquitt EMC.



Sausage Balls

INGREDIENTS

1 lb. sausage

1 10 oz. pkg. shredded sharp cheddar cheese 2 cups baking mix

DIRECTIONS

Allow cheese and sausage to reach room temperature. Place in mixing bowl with baking mix and blend until smooth. Mixture will be quite dry. Line a cookie sheet with aluminum foil. Spray well with vegetable oil spray. Press/roll mixture into 1-inch balls by hand; place on cookie sheet about 1 inch apart. Bake in 400-degree Fahrenheit oven for 10 to 12 minutes, or until golden brown. Drain on paper toweling. Serve warm.



Bacon-Wrapped Dates

INGREDIENTS

1 10 oz. pkg. pitted dates 1/2 lb. bacon, sliced into quarters

DIRECTIONS

Microwave bacon for about 2 minutes, until partially cooked, but not browned. Wrap each date with a strip of bacon and secure with a wooden toothpick. Broil on low 3 minutes, turn dates and continue broiling 3-4 minutes longer or until browned. Drain on paper towel and serve warm.
