## Colquitt EMC Offers Aid to Fellow Co-ops

**A**s harsh winter weather swept across the state in January, many EMCs prepared for outages and damages that could potentially occur. Electric cooperatives that were hit hardest called upon other EMCs to provide help and support.

Colquitt EMC geared up to assist fellow electric cooperatives by mobilizing employees and contract crews.

Colquitt EMC sent three district crews to Walton EMC in Monroe, three contract crews to Jackson EMC in Jefferson, and lent a total of 18 equipped trucks.

The statewide EMC disaster plan has laid the groundwork for quickly getting help from related EMCs when needed. The mutual cooperative objective is to restore power as fast as possible when outages occur.

## Residential Energy Tax Credits Extended

**T**he federal tax incentives that were due to expire on December 31, 2010, have been extended through 2011, but with some significant changes. The new tax credit has been reduced from 30% to 10% of cost, with a maximum credit of \$500. Included are also provisions limiting window incentives to \$200, oil and gas furnace and boiler incentives

to \$150-\$200, and water heater and wood heating system incentives to \$300.



The \$2,000 federal tax credit for builders who build energy efficient homes that are at least 50% more efficient than code minimums has also been extended.

#### ELECTRIFICATION PROJECT TO GO ON Funds Appropriated for Continuance of Work by Commissioners

Funds with which to proceed with plans for rural electrification in Colquitt County were voted Tuesday afternoon by the Board of County Commissioners and Reed Bingham, who has been making a survey on the project was authorized to continue his preparations for the next two months.

With backing of the county commissioners, the electrification of rural districts in Colquitt County took another step toward realization.

Bingham said he would continue home to home canvas of the rural areas proposed to be electrified, and would sign those desiring their homes and buildings wired for electrical current.

Berlin was eliminated from another project for rural electrification which included counties south of Colquitt, Bingham stated, but was included in the project now proposed.

Expressed approval of the rural electrification project in this area by the Washington administration is expected now that definite plans have been completed and a large number of prospective customers signed to have their premises electrified.

The commissioners also agreed to allot the millage collected in the various districts for relief purposes to welfare work in that district. The Moultrie area's millage will be turned over to city welfare board for use.



## Recipes of the Month



### Chicken Noodle Soup

- 2 teaspoons butter
- 1 cup sliced celery
- 1 cup chopped carrot
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 small potato, diced
- 1 teaspoon thyme
- 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 4 (14 ounce) cans chicken broth
- 2 teaspoons chicken bouillon
- 4 ounces egg noodles
- 2 cups cooked chicken
- parsley

Melt butter in large pot. Sauté the celery, carrot and onion for 2 minutes. Add potato, thyme, poultry seasoning, chicken broth and bouillon. Bring to a boil. Add noodles and chicken and cook on low for 20 minutes. Sprinkle with parsley.

### The Ultimate Strawberry Shortcake

- 1 quart fresh strawberries (or more if you like)
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 8 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 1 (8 ounce) container frozen whipped topping
- 1 (14 ounce) angel food cake, cut into cubes

Wash, stem, and cut strawberries in half. Add sugar; toss to mix well. Chill. Beat cream cheese and powdered sugar well. Fold in whipped topping and cake cubes. Spread cake into an ungreased 13x9 dish. Cover and chill for at least 2 hours. Cut cake into squares; top with strawberries.
